



## **PARK ARE SO UNLUCKY**

**W**elcome to Parknews. Saturday brought the end of the 1st XV season with a match that was anything but a typical end-of-season affair. The final 21-27 scoreline does not begin to tell the story of a match that seemed to hinge on a controversial red card for Park scrum half, Will Crow, in the 31st minute, that left Park playing the remainder of the match a man short.

It was impossible from where your correspondent was standing to see exactly what happened. Will certainly went into a ruck where Ampthill's giant number 8 and skipper Mamma Molitika was on the floor. Molitika's reaction was sufficient to get him yellow-carded and then, after a lengthy conversation with the touch judge Will was shown red, apparently alleged to have deliberately kicked or stamped on the opponent. Presumably Park will review the video and appeal if that appears appropriate.

What is certain is that a match that Park appeared to be edging at 7-3 (A try for James Inglis, playing his final match before retirement) saw them suddenly cast as underdogs in a battle against the odds. It was a battle the players were clearly up for. Andrew Henderson finished off a good move to extend the lead to 14-3 early in the second half, but three tries against a short-handed defence saw Ampthill take a 20-14 lead with 15 minutes remaining.

Park summoned up a truly breathtaking move, finished off by Jamie Harries for a great try, converted by Harry Leonard to give a 21-20 lead into the last 5 minutes. Some really committed tackling looked to have successfully defended that lead until - in the very last moment of added time - Ampthill flanker Joe Bercis forced his way over for the winner. There was not time even to re-start.

So an incredibly dramatic end to the season, albeit with Park on the wrong end. It was impossible, though, not to sympathise with a Park team who would have finished sixth regardless of the result, but chose to battle with all they had. It was certainly enough to erase the memory of Blaydon the previous Saturday!

### **Rosslyn Park 21 Ampthill 27 National 1**

**P**ark had to battle a man short for more than half the match, only to see victory over the third-placed club snatched from them by a converted try in the last second of added time.

Full back Steff Jones put Ampthill ahead on 7minutes with a well-struck penalty.

Park were soon back with a clever kick from number 8, Ed Milne, being taken in full stride by James Inglis who scored a try, converted by fly half Harry Leonard for 7-3 to Park.

The shape of the match changed on 31 minutes when at a ruck home scrum half Will Crow was adjudged to have stamped on Ampthill skipper Mamma Molitika, who was yellow-carded for his reaction.

last second of the match when flanker Joe Bercis forced his way over the line for a last gasp winner, Jones' conversion adding insult to injury.

Rosslyn Park Attack and Defece Coach, Scott Sneddon said, "We asked the boys to show some pride in the jersey as the previous couple of games we came up short for what's required in a Rosslyn Park jersey. Unfortunately we didn't get the result we deserved but as coaches we were happy with the performance.

"Playing for 55 minutes with 14 men, at 45 minutes with 13 was the difference. A few decisions didn't go our way but credit to Ampthill, they kept coming at us and we couldn't hold out at the end.

This will doubtless cause much joshing when the away supporters reassemble to report for our pre-season training (usually a brewery tour, followed by the Charlbury Beer Festival). Indeed this undeserved accolade is only mentioned here because failure to do so would lead to even worse leg-pulling.

### The award that wasn't made

The big problem with Scott Sneddon and Keiran Power making the awards is that it precluded them from getting the recognition they deserve for a difficult job well done. It should be remembered that we started this season on a significantly reduced playing budget, and having lost several key players. A member of the Management Board asked the Editor at the beginning of the season how I thought Park would do: putting aside hopeful optimism, I said that I thought realistically we would do very well to finish halfway. I still think given the playing budget constraints and personnel available that was a fair call.

We had a nightmare start to the season, as a result of which that most decent of men Andy Holloway fell on his sword leaving Scott and Kieran in charge. They have had to work around the worst injury list that any of us can remember, to deliver a final position of sixth in National One. That is a really significant achievement by two young coaches who are also two of the nicest blokes you could ever meet. Thanks, guys!

One final word on awards: there are lots of unsung heroes around the Club who do amazing things to keep the various parts of Rosslyn Park running. It's invidious to single people out, but an honourable mention in dispatches should go to Tony and Janet Lawrence. They rarely miss an away match, always staff a control point at the Schools 7s, Tony has the wayward genius of the Accountant and is thus probably the only person who could compile the running order for the Schools 7s and - if that wasn't enough - often acts as Fourth Official at 1st XV home matches.

### Hail and Farewell

The re-signing of players for next season is going well, with the majority of this season's core squad already having put pen to paper. However, there are two players to whom we have to bid a fond farewell and wish them luck in their new careers. Prop **Mark Lilley** has already had a couple of successful years coaching Bath University alongside his Rosslyn Park commitments, but he has now added to his portfolio the job of Forwards Coach to the Bath Rugby Academy. That means that Mark's time for training midweek and playing on Saturdays would be greatly curtailed. Add to the mix a nagging shoulder injury and Mark has taken the sensible option of retirement. Lock **James Inglis** has accepted a teaching post at Wellington College, which unfortunately affects his Saturday commitment to Rugby at National 1 level, though he may well continue playing elsewhere. It will not be a major surprise to bump into James at the Schools 7s next year!

We thank both men very much for their efforts on behalf of the Club and they will be welcome visitors whenever they choose to drop in at the Rock.

lip, when one of the cars was stuck in traffic and the game had to kick off with the Bs having 10 players against Ruislip's 15. Jack Harrison, making his debut for the team delicately chipped through in the opening play for top scorer Tom Caines to score between the posts for the 10 men of the Bs.

Things however took a turn for the worse in early October when a forfeit due to lack of players was followed by bad injuries to Bs legend Graham Lloyd and Captain Daniel Bimson, ruling both of these key players and stalwarts out for the season.

The Bs went back to the drawing board and heavy recruitment through all means (including a Gumtree ad). Great pushes from the likes of Matt Tainton, Nick Jones and Tom Caines, along with the lure of Friday Night Lights and Ally Byers coordinating the social side to show off what the Bs do best meant a last minute victory against London Cornish with Toby Finneran scoring the winning try on his debut. This victory seemed to be the beginning of a swing in momentum. It was at first slow to build, but it was clear that times were changing, with great first half performances often let down by a lack of substitutes as Christmas approached.

It was in the New Year that the hard work started to pay off and that a dominant pack, along with some champagne rugby from the backs meant that the Bs ended the season on a four game winning streak, including denying Hampstead a play-off place thanks to a 61-5 win at the Rock and denying Chiswick top spot in the league in the last game of the season, thanks to a 22-10 victory under the floodlights. Sadly the push came too late to make the play-offs but things seem to be in place for next year and the signs are that the Bs should be competing back at the top of the table

again next season.

Summer touch has already started with around 10-15 players playing every Monday and on the odd Saturday, a couple of Sevens tournaments are booked in, one of the largest Tours in recent times is taking place in for York from 5th-7th May, with 27 tourists and the social side means that even when there is nothing official planned, most Saturdays seem to feature a gathering of Bs terrorising the Northcote road and surrounding area.

Special mentions for the season go to Bimmo who has kept going despite a tough few years with injuries, LWill Ferrand for stepping up into the captaincy with aplomb and enthusiasm, loydy, who despite his injury is always available to impart his wisdom and stories on younger members of the team, Richie Foreman who played 80 minutes at prop most weeks, despite claims that he was retiring, Nick Jones who carries on helping out despite having handed over the reins a couple of years ago, George Pappadakis, who has used some of his tax avoidance money to back the Bs financially from his exile in Cayman and pay for the brand new kit, Ally Byers whose work at Social Sec keeps the team ticking along at all times, Tom Caines who has helped bring in the new blood that the Bs needed, Luke Weller, who has only missed about 5 games since he joined three years ago and has captained the team to some key victories over the year and Ozzie Wolf, who came into the team for one game, as a way of getting fit to play for Barnes and never left, putting in some huge performances over the course of the season. Here's to next season, up the B's!

### The End of an Era

It feels like the end of an era with Shaun Justice deciding to move on from being MD. If any one person is the architect of the resurgence of Park from near-relegation candidates in Two South, to top half of National One, with state-of-the art pitch and floodlights along with revenue-earning advertising boards, it is Shaun.

It was Napoleon who demanded that his generals be lucky, and Shaun would be the first to acknowledge that a couple of things got him off to a flying start. Simon Tindall turned up at the club, seeking to help the club for which his grandfather played with great distinction, and Chris Ritchie returned from London Welsh when they decided to go full-time professional. The combination - to put it crudely - of Simon's chequebook and Chris's contact book was certainly a very positive start!

Whilst some were content to bask in the reflected glory of on-field success Shaun had the foresight to see that while we'd repainted, and the house was beginning to look as good as new, the foundations were still in need of considerable repair. Secure funding

needed to be generated if the club was not to depend upon the continued generosity of a few individuals. And to do that meant that we needed to change a lot of things. The old 'Committee' system, which had served the club well in its amateur years needed to be reshaped to survive at the top end of the semi-professional game. Doing this without losing the best parts of the unique Rosslyn Park ethos was the key.

Shaun drove through the concept of the Management Board. It would be to re-write history to say he did this without encountering opposition. Many people who had given years of unstinting service to the club were at best sceptical as to the direction things were moving in, but he saw it through. Looking out through the clubhouse windows now at a 4G pitch, modern floodlights and a team in the top half of National, it is difficult to argue that he was wrong!

Ideas are one thing and execution another, but he has shown immense skill, patience and determination in steering these things through. Some achievements have been under-valued. Yes, many previous administrations recognised the potential of advertising boards, but they all foundered on the vagaries of planning permission. Shaun drove it through, with appropriate professional support, and with a great investment of his own time and with diplomatic skills that those who know him might not previously have credited him with.

Few realise how much effort it takes in these days of contracts and players agents just to get a squad together to play a season's rugby.

John Adair, before the match, and Scott Sneddon after it paid adequate enough tributes to Shaun's achievements not to repeat them here. I hope Shaun will forgive me for revealing a couple of things from private conversations, but I do feel that it is important that supporters realise quite how honourably he has acted. It is true that his leaving now is probably best for him before he becomes typecast and prejudices his chances of starting an alternative career. But he also felt really bad about asking players to accept cuts if he was not making sacrifices himself. He felt that after getting things like the 4G pitch, floodlights and advertising boards sorted - which took an immense amount of his time - a key piece of his job would disappear, and he didn't want to be in a position of drawing a salary from the club he loves but not feeling he was really any longer fully earning it. He has offered to take on any unpaid role that he can dovetail with whatever he does next.

Shaun, the retiring MD, deserves our gratitude and respect. So too does the bloke.

### National 1 Review

**C**hampions **Hartpury** became the first side ever to win National One winning all 30 of their matches, and only twice did they fail to gain the four-try bonus. On Saturday they won away to **Black-eath** (who finish seventh, a place behind ourselves) by 22-43. To be honest, Hartpury did not win many friends, but that had nothing at all to do with the sparkling Rugby they played and they deserve our congratulations.

**Plymouth Albion** won by 15-40 at **Cambridge** to extend their winning run to 13 matches and claim the runners-up spot. Cambridge finished third from bottom but are spared demotion by the demise of London Welsh.

the last touch of the match. The other relegated club is **Macclesfield**, who lost 12-24 to revitalised **Esher**.

**Caldy** are promoted from Two North despite a 34-36 defeat by Sedgley Park, while **Sale's** 44-14 away win assured them a home match in the Play-Off for the other promotion place. **Bishops Stortford** get the automatic promotion place from Two South, their 28-21 win over Barnes condemns our near neighbours to relegation, being replaced by Wimbledon, who beat Dings Crusaders 50-5 to clinch promotion. The other promoted side is **Old Elthamians** who won their final match against Barnstaple by 68-21. That match attracted 854 spectators, only a hundred fewer than watched Blackheath v Hartpury just up the road.
