The lead lasted for only seven minutes before a concerted attack from the visitors saw Leonard get over the line, converting his own effort for 10-10.

Park piled on the pressure but the hosts defended well, though they lost two players to successive yellow cards for their troubles.

Loughborough took a surprise lead with a Waters penalty on 29 minutes, but Park replied immediately with the move of the match that sent full-back Henry Robinson scampering in for a try to give the visitors a 15-13 lead at the interval.



Loughborough started the second half playing down the slope but it was Park's performance that went downhill.

Eight minutes into the second period home centre Oscar Hinklij-Douglas grabbed a try, converted by Waters, to put his side into the lead at 20-15.

When the same two players struck again on 60 minutes things looked really bleak for the visitors at 27-15.

Park tried to come back, and only a fine last ditch tackle in the corner stopped Charlie Amesbury from claiming what would have been a great try.

However when Waters slotted over a penalty on 71 minutes it left Park needing more than two converted tries in the limited time remaining.

They set about the task, getting close to the line before a stray ball allowed home replacement scrum half George de Cothi to intercept and run the length of the field and score under the posts, Waters converting, to set the seal on a match that Park will want to forget.

On a blustery Saturday afternoon Rosslyn Park ran out 31-15 winners at home to Fylde RFC. The visitors started the day bottom of the pile in national one whilst Rosslyn Park aimed to continue a good run of form that has seen them undefeated this calendar year.

Park got off to a strong start with winger Benji Marfo dotting down for the games first score after 9 minutes, with a quick tap penalty from Jack Gash put him into space before beating one man into the corner.

The second score of the game soon followed as Arthur Ellis managed to push his way over the line on his home debut for the club. The conversion from Harry Leonard was successful to make it 12-0 after twenty minutes.

Moments later though, Fylde got off the mark with a try from Harlan Corrie who was the most alert player when an over-thrown lineout bobbled around on the turf.

Just before half time Park grabbed their third try of the game as Henry Spencer got onto the back of a driving maul from five meters out to make the score 17-7 at the break.



Five minutes into the second half Fylde made it a one score game with a penalty in front of the sticks from Greg Smith bringing the score to 17-10

With just over twenty minutes on the clock the home side secured their try bonus point as Oli Grove busted his way through Fylde's defence from close range.

Park then brought on England under 20's player and former Fylde man Rory Brand and ex-Bristol and Harlequins winger Charlie Amesbury. A fantastic chip through from Andrew Henderson was gathered by full back Robinson who won a penalty, which Park elected to kick into the corner. The resulting lineout was driven over the line and Owen Hughes managed to touch the ball down to bring the score to 31-10 to the hosts.

Replacement prop Stuart Maguire was then yellow carded for a high tackle with ten minutes on the clock.

Visitors Fylde got the last score of the game through Tom Carleton, much to the delight of their fantastic travelling support.

Rosslyn Park head coach Kieran Power said after the match "It was good to get 5 points again but still plenty to work on. We have a big couple of

## **Bishop's Stortford 20**

### **Park 22**

After a strong start, Stortford errors allow Rosslyn Park to gain confidence to go on and win a deserved victory.

Stortford started strongly and dominated the first 7 minutes in this game, but came away with only three points from a George Cullen penalty after



some stout Park defence. A pinpoint crosskick from the visitors' flyhalf, Harry Leonard quickly overturned the lead, as the stretched Stortford defence was breached out wide by quick hands, leading to an unconverted try to Benji Marfo.

Within three minutes, the home lead was restored, though when a fortunate ricochet from a George Cullen grubber kick flew straight into Chris Smith's





hands, allowing the winger to run round the last defender and touch down close enough to the posts to give Cullen a relatively easy conversion.

Despite repeatedly turning the ball over, Stortford prevented the opposition from making any serious threats for the rest of the half but then two yellow cards for foul play at breakdowns in the last five minutes to Tom McCrone and Smith turned the game on its head. The situation was soon worsened with a late injury to Dec Caulfield, but the home side nevertheless held out until half time.

They had, though left themselves with a major challenge at the start of the second period and, sure enough, the visitors were quickly onto the attack and their slick backs, gaining confidence as they retained possession against only 13 defenders, progressively came into the game. Although, Stortford's stubborn defence held them out for 5 minutes, some clever interplay between winger, Marfo and fullback, Henry Robinson eventually produced a good try for the latter, converted from the touchline by Harry Leonard.

Even after Stortford were restored to their full complement, Park maintained their momentum and they took full advantage of a poor clearance kick by the home side to switch play to the opposite wing, where centre, Andrew Henderson this time rounded off some more skilful backs play for an unconverted try.

The home side now showed their mettle, fighting back to exert significant pressure on the Park defence and were rewarded some 9 minutes later with



another Cullen penalty, after a second Chris Smith try was disallowed for a forward pass. This briefly boosted the home side and one of a number of excellent attacking kicks from Cullen put them into the Park 22. A great lineout steal capitalised on the position and the pack seized on the opportunity to go through a couple of quick driving phases to allow Steve Ball to touch down. Cullen's conversion took his team into a 5 point lead.

This proved, though to be short-lived, as the visitors launched a sweeping attack through powerful forwards, with their dominant back row to the fore, gaining quick ball at a number of breakdowns, backed up by more good handling from their backs. This produced a penalty, which was kicked to touch and there was no stopping the driving maul from the resultant 5 metre

lineout. Leonard couldn't convert and Stortford once again fought their way back into the game.

Boosted by a yellow card to the visitors' loosehead prop for a scrummaging offence, the home side launched a final assault on the Park line with time running out and, showing impressive patience, they went through many phases before releasing the ball wide, where a 3 on 2 beckoned. Unfortunately, the backs couldn't produce the precision necessary to take the opportunity and finished with a desperate lunge for the line being snuffed out with a strong cover tackle, which ended the game.

On Saturday, the B's returned to the Rock, having not played there in over two months to take on local rivals Hammersmith and Fulham. Having conceded 50 points against the B's at home, the Hammers were keen to make amends and had few survivors of their home defeat. The B's also had a very strong squad with 25 players putting their hands up and a few having to miss out, but making up for it with their vocal support.

The B's have not always turned up from the get go this season, but this time decided to start at a ferocious pace. Some great power in the forwards mixed with pace in the backs put top try scorer Dean Asonitis through in the corner. Park kicked off and quickly enjoyed a period of possession. Dorking, being perhaps too enthusiastic in defence, gave Parmenter, Porter and Longley space to take advantage. After Dorking were caught offside and Stern picked out his man at the lineout, the Hatters set up a strong drive. Unfortunately, despite good possession and territory, Park struggled to cross the whitewash. was not converted. This was soon to change after Chrissy Scott took a quick penalty and made a barnstorming run down the left wing. Pulled down 5 yards out, Davies made a strong run to crash over. 5-0. No convert.

From the restart, Dorking started strongly and it was the Hatters turn to defend, with Peck putting in a big hit in the midfield, no doubt looking to sort out his dodgy neck. Foot, who was a rock at the front of the lineout, stealing several of Dorking's throws, won a defensive lineout from which the ball was cleared well by Beale. With less than ten minutes to halftime, the Hatters took their eye off the ball and allowed ill-discipline to let Dorking score ten unanswered points with a penalty and converted try. 10 all. However, the ship soon steadied as the Hatters forwards took a grip and set up an excellent lineout and scored a well-earned pushover try to regain the lead at 15-10. This gave Park the confidence to start playing again with ball in hand as Somerville, who had woken up in Milton Keynes, running hard in the midfield, releasing Longers whose quick hands put Savage over in the corner. With Longers finally finding his kicking boots, 22-10. Longers had the last word gathering Porters' opportunistic kick to score in the corner to finish with a decisive 27-10 win to take the Hatters into the Surrey Tankard final due to be played at Esher on 7 May.

Chobham came back hard as play concentrated in the middle of the field. Strong defensive play from de Haan led to an impressive turnover. Foot and Davies were putting in the hard yards taking the ball again and again off Riley at 9. With a hint of space, Alexander made a break on the outside beating several defenders in the process. In what looked a little too cosy, Chrissy in support took the offload before returning the ball to Adam - and in a final act of devotion, AA fed the ball back to the Scottish back row to score under the posts. Crawford, now warmed up, took the extras. 12-0 to the Hatters.

Continuing to apply pressure, Park won a penalty in Chobham's 22. Captain Longley opted for a scrum, a bold decision had it not been for the

dominance that Horgan, de Haan and Stern were exerting up front. With a couple of passes from the set piece, Porter did what he does best (not pass) palming off several defenders to score under the posts. With the extras added I, Hatters 19, Chobham 0.

A frustrating ten minutes ensued where the Hatters allowed Chobham to play for the first time in the match. However to their credit, Park did not let them cross the whitewash with strong defensive play from Willis and Newcombe, the latter of whom was in the Chobham 10's face all day.

At halftime Longers challenged the boys to keep Chobham to 0, a challenge Park rose to. With Wardie and Peck now on in the back row, Newcs switching to the centres and Longers to 9, the finishers had a point to prove. Within minutes, Newcombe came on a hard and fast line from 10 yards out - with the conversion, it was 26-0.

The Hatters were playing with increasing confidence. After some hard running and good interplay between Newcombe and Foot, Davies ran a superb dummy line from the ensuing breakdown to create the space for Stern to smash over for a great score under the posts. Crawford did the business to make it 33-0.

Park's final score of the match came from a strong chase and fly-hack from Parmenter, before Rosser snaffled the ball almost from Adam's hands to take bring up, with Ali's conversion, 40.

It could have been more, had the returning Wilson managed to gather a well-weighted pass from Crawford to score in the corner, but the ball evaded his grasp trickling into touch. It was clear from the start that the Slingbacks were far the better side. This was apparently also clear to the referee, and possibly the fact that it took more than 20 minutes for Park to register a score had more to do with his efforts to 'even things up' than any deficiency in Park's play. Almost the entire first quarter was played in Quins' territory, yet it was Park who were persistently adjudged to have offended or mishandled. From the touchline it looked as if Quins were being allowed to lie all over the ball, whereas Park



were persistently whistled for technical offences, real or imagined.

When eventually Park did get a penalty, scrum half Rachel Collins took a quick tap to set up the powerful Hannah Murphy to crash over for 5-0.

Play had hardly re-started when Alice Lovatt received the ball close to halfway and simply pinned her ears back, beating fully six defenders to cross the line for a wonderful individual effort. Shanice Williams added a conversion for 12-0.



It looked as if Park would run riot when Hannah – about to cross for a second try – was halted by a penalty that defied understanding. However, justice was done when Rachel sniped the ball from a Quins scrum and dived over for a try, Shanice adding the extras for 19-0 at the interval.

Almost from kick off, Park struck again with a super run from full-back Anja Grant that saw her go under the posts, Shanice again converting for 26-0.

Maintaining the pressure, Park added further smart tries from Rachel and Ellie to stretch the lead to 36-0.

A rare Quins attack, aided and abetted by two distinctly questionable penalty decisions, took the home side to the Park 5-metre line, from where



they crashed over and converted for 36-7.

Park were determined to have the last say and some good work by Rachel and Chrissy Overton sent Emma in, Shanice converting for 43-7, before Rachel went over again to complete her hat-trick for 48-7.

There was just time for a Quins player to make a good break. She was tackled round the waist and carried into touch - only for a penalty to be awarded on the 5-metre line! Furious Park showed the sort of determination in defence one might expect if the result had depended upon it, and when they cleared the final whistle went.

### Find your Inner Warrior

**Owen Slot, Chief Rugby correspondent of The Times**, visited the Rock recently to witness the Slingbacks' "Inner Warrior" event at their Wednesday evening training session. The following piece appeared in the paper:

On a refrigerated Wednesday evening in southwest London last week, I saw the next generation of Caslicks and Tonegatos. Except they were mostly English and they were not particularly motivated by Olympic medals.

On the all-weather pitch at Rosslyn Park, a small group of new players had pitched up to join a session with the club's women's team, the Slingbacks. Katy Daley-Mclean, the England fly half (94 caps), was there to give her encouragement. Daley-Mclean's England team-mates are attending these events all around the country.

This is an RFU campaign, called Inner Warrior, designed to recruit more women into the game. The blurb encourages you to "free your inner

warrior". At Rosslyn Park, the initial message seemed simply about having fun.

Everywhere on the pitch, there were examples of talent transfer. You can spot the netball players immediately, because they catch the ball, stop and pivot. You can see the footballers, running upfield ahead of the ball to find space.

Handball players try to snatch the ball from the opposition rather than making a tackle. At one point, a tall, slim woman received the ball out wide and immediately caught the eye — a fast, very agile, upright runner. Ah yes, that was the ballerina.

Since the launch of Inner Warrior last year, more than 10,500 women have attended camps; 3,500 of them had never picked up a rugby ball before. Last year, 41 new women's rugby teams were established.

Up and down the country, the story is the same. Very few girls play rugby at school, so most people coming to these camps arrive with skills that they probably never thought would transfer so well from other sports. Those who have played team ball sports may not realise it, but they have been educated to understand spatial awareness.

What is interesting is the impact of the new-age footballers. The traditional girls' sports — hockey, netball, rounders — don't teach girls to kick. Maybe that is why, at the women's rugby World Cup last summer, it was kicking skills that were in short supply. Only New Zealand and England, the teams in the final, had decent kicking games.

All the new Warriors at Rosslyn Park that night seemed to have fun. They all said that they would be back. I would encourage anyone else to follow them.



Men's rugby used to be a game for different skillsets and shapes and sizes, but that is decreasingly the case. The women's game can boast that now; all shapes, all sizes welcome, all skillsets, netball players, ballerinas, the lot.

### Away travel

Next Saturday Park play away to **Caldy**, kicking off at 14:00 and there is a considerable advantage in booking an advance ticket. The nearest station is West Kirby, and the normal routing from London is via Chester, but it is worth checking at the time you book whether it might be cheaper and quicker to get an Advance return ticket to Liverpool Lime Street and pick up a local train from there on a cheap day return. It's about 20 minutes on the local rattler, with a fairly regular service. This will be the first time we have visited Caldly for a League match, though we did play in their excellent Sevens tournament many moons ago, so we cannot offer any intelligence as to local hostellers.

On Saturday 24 February we travel to **Hull Ionians** for the re-arranged League match. Check out the Hull Trains service for that one, which is usually a lot cheaper than the Virgin East Coast route and avoids changing trains at Doncaster. Brough is the nearest station to the ground. Their 09:27 service arrives in Hull around noon; after the match the train home is not until 18:48, but the Buccaneer pub very close to the station provides a convenient bolt hole. The ground is about a mile and a half from there: if you want to get a cab then book it as soon as you arrive — available taxis there seem to be as rare as sightings of Bob Fisher's wallet.

After that it's **Plymouth Albion** (03 March) with Plymouth obviously the

station to book to. Their Brickfields ground really requires a cab ride from the station unless you are a keen walker. Our regular away supporters have a regular pub crawl that starts at the Blue Anchor in the Barbican area as close to 11:00 as transport permits. Look out for staggering red and white hoops if you fancy sharing a cab.
