CLOSE - BUT PARK RECORD ANOTHER WIN

Welcome to Parknews Another close home match saw Park record a 20-15 win over Sale, who proved to be pretty stiff opposition. You cannot assume you'll beat any side good enough to be in National 1, let alone get the bonus point. Nevertheless the players will be disappointed after grabbing three tries before the interval that they were unable to push on to register a fourth! It was not for want of trying, and looked bound to come when Park laid siege to the Sale line through multiple phases deep into added time. Then moments later in the very last seconds Sale so nearly got an interception try, only stopped by some alert defending, and we were grateful to scramble the ball off the field and settle for just the win! It's the beauty of live sport.

The result leaves us still just a point behind Rams, who won away at Bishops Stortford by 21-19, but Cinderford secured maximum points from a seventh successive win – this time by 50-12 over Leeds – to open up a lead of five points over us. Chinnor are 8 points behind us in fourth after a 20-23 home defeat by Darlington Mowden Park, but with a game in hand. Due to Old Elthamians dropping out of the league, we have a blank weekend for the Firsts so there is potential for our rivals to pull further ahead (Cinderford are home to Taunton while Rams visit Darlington Mowden Park). However, the following Saturday we have an opportunity to put our future back in our own hands so far as the leaders are concerned with a massive top-of-the table clash at the Rock against our old friends Cinderford. Don't miss that one!

Match report Park 20 Sale 15 National 1



Park saw off a brave effort from Sale, but could not press on for a bonus point despite scoring three tries in the first half. Park did have their chances to grab the extra point but if Park were not at their moist clinical much credit for that must go to the Manchester side who came to play their own brand of attacking rugby, often denying Park useful possession for long periods. Both sides were determined not to get caught in possession in their own territory, thus the ball seemed to spend an inordinate amount of time in midair.

If early play was even, it was Park who were more decisive. A surge from the Park pack as early as the third minute saw skipper Hugo Ellis use his power to get over from a ruck for 5-0.

Sale nearly caught the Park defence but were offside. Park replied and many thought they had scored with a charge to the line but the effort was ruled out as 'held up' and Sale dropped out to clear.

Another score looked on the cards with a neat kick through the Sale defence but even a flying Benji Marfo couldn't quite get to the ball before it went dead.

Park were awarded a penalty just inside the 22 which saw a Sale winger sent to the bin. Park kicked to the corner and made Hay when prop Austin of that name forced his way over, fly half Luc Smith converting for 12-0 on 23 minutes.

It was another penalty, kicked to the corner, that brought Park's third try but this time it was a super passing movement across the goal from the left that saw Marfo pounce in the right corner for 17-0 with less than 5 minutes to the interval.

Park could not hold out, however, allowing Sale to run in a try with two minutes to go: neatly done, but one they would have backed themselves to defend. The conversion, in off the post, made it 17-7 at half-time.

Sale made a dream start to the second period, gaining a penalty after only two minutes for Johnson to narrow the gap to only 17-10.

fine players. It is a pity it all had to end on a low key. But something was obviously not right, and to keep doing the same thing and expecting a different outcome was not a tenable strategy.

25 years ago the Rosslyn Park women's team, aka The Slingbacks, played their first league game after Jane Seymour and Kay Booker gently persuaded George Sturgis to fund a women's team at The Rock. The team went from strength to strength, winning the Junior National Cup on many occasions and winning promotion at least 5 years on the trot under the watchful eye of coach lan 'Fish' Hutchinson. They became a force to be reckoned with in, and outside of, London and having secured a First XV place in Premiership 2, a Second XV - Slingbacks Too - was formed thanks to the hard work of the Committee members, Sally Leonard in particular with coaches Martyn Worsley and Matt Mandelbaum at the helm. With retirements, family and work commitments, membership reduced but the Slingbacks 1XV remained strong and played competitively in their league for many seasons. Unfortunately the pandemic affected numbers even further and led to where we are today.

It will definitely not be the end of women's rugby at the Rock – quite the reverse. As a club, we need a Women's team, and hopefully more than one. We want to build a structure that allows girls a pathway from the minis to play at the adult level at the highest level they can aspire to – even if that means starting at a lower level than we recently occupied and working our way up. The fact is that women's rugby has thrived at other local clubs with facilities that cannot match those we can offer at Rosslyn Park. We need to learn the necessary lessons and re-build, and that is what we'll do, along with those players who kept training and playing and want to be a part of a programme to get women's Rugby at Rosslyn Park to where we want it to be.

25 years of Committees equates to around 200 people who have played a part in the administration and running of the Slingbacks and there is not enough space to be able to mention everyone. So apologies to the many missed but special mentions go to Jo Starling, Susie Cuff, Clare Bowen, Alice Lovett, David Mobbs-Smith, Mark Barnes, Elizabeth Delves, Esther King, Maria Castellina, Sam Emery and Nicola Smith. Not forgetting Anna Butler, who was an original Slingback, left The Rock as a player in 2006 and returned last season to become Head Coach, and Julia Daffy (who is now on the club's Management Board).

Later in the season we'll organise a social event that everyone involved with the Slingbacks over the years can attend. If an era has to end, better with a bang than a whimper. "Once a Slingback always a Slingback".

Cardiac screening

Players are being made aware that the club has invested in offering all its playing membership a FOC Cardiac Screening. It is not compulsory but recommended. This will be taking place at the club on the 3rd of November. The team who will visit the club is made up of consultant cardiologists, senior cardiac nurses and specialist physiologists. Each player is given a questionnaire to complete which is designed to identify potential cardiac risk factors, a resting 12 lead ECG and a blood pressure check. These results are reviewed straight away by the cardiologists. Should the cardiologist decide that further information is needed they will conduct a short consultation with the player and they may then recommend an echocardiogram (ultrasound of the heart) which can be done immediately at the club. About 5 - 10% of players are likely to be advised to have an echocardiogram and a small proportion of these may then be advised to go onto further investigations such as a cardiac MRI. Should the cardiologist decide that further investigations are indicated we can either arrange these through their own clinic or, if the player wishes, they can send a report to their own GP with recommendations for further investigations. We will shortly be sending out a time schedule for players to book in and reserve your testing time.

Away travel

We have two away matches in November: Birmingham Moseley on 13th and Caldy on 27th. Moseley play at Billesley Common, Yardley Wood Road, Billesley, Birmingham, B13 0HN. Our regulars usually decamp at Birmingham New Street and visit a hostelry or two in town, getting a cab from there, though it's not cheap if there are not a few to share. Alternatively, buses 2 and 3 from the nearby Park Street bus stand go to Billesley common very close to the ground. Either way the traffic is usually a nightmare so leave plenty of time. If you're happy to miss the joys of central Birmingham and just want to see the match, you could book to Yardley Wood station which is just about walkable to the ground (just very slightly more than a mile). For that you need to make the short walk interchange from Birmingham New Street to Moor Street station which is clearly signposted. The journey is a maximum of 15 minutes with trains leaving at 10 and 30 past the hour (returning at 05 and 45). From Yardley Wood it is a straightforward walk to the ground. There are no decent hostelries in the area for your refreshment (unless - as a Moseley supporter memorably advised - you want lager, Sky sports and a fight on the way out) but the clubhouse at the ground serves food and a decent pint and is invariably very friendly.

For **Caldy** we have found that the best route is to get to Liverpool Lime Street and then go down to the metro interchange and take the metro to West Kirby, which is roughly 2 miles from the ground



(the rail planner may suggest a route via Chester). There is an 82 bus from West Kirby station that runs to Telegraph Road, which is about 400 yards from the ground at 12:02 and 14:02, but it is so infrequent that a cab will be your best bet. There is also a frequent bus service (430 or 437 from the centre of Liverpool (Union Court, just off Cook Street) to and from West Kirby station. For refreshments, turn right out of the station and a few yards along is the West Kirby Tap which serves decent food and a good pint.

It's not until 08 January, but don't waste time planning a visit to Leeds Tykes new ground. They are paying Park the compliment of hiring the Headingley Stadium for that particular match, kicking off at 2:30PM

Mike's obituary

It was with great sadness that we learned of the death of Mike Frangos, who passed away peacefully, at home, on Tuesday May

Mike's unique belting voice and towering frame soon did the job. They ate it all

Hungover freezing Sunday morning training sessions at Barn Elms, fighting with the so-called cooker in the portacabin and Mike screeching to a halt, striding in with his arms full of bacon for me to prep a million bacon rolls... woe betide the punter who asked for it to be "more crispy". Mike soon declared him to be an ungrateful sod - as he undoubtedly was. I was privileged to co-sponsor, with Mike, a whole bunch of minis tours in the U9s to U12s years. Mike's passion for getting it right, the food, the fun, the fanatical attention to detail - these tours will live on forever in the memory of the tourists and the parents. Mike's towering presence on the touchline, be that an U8 training session or a first team clash against Esher was a bellowing inspiration. Unmissable, impossible to ignore, His fierce love for the boys and his commitment to the club ran deep, and he was never afraid to show his emotion - he loved life and wanted us to love it too. So farewell, big man, you roaring tower of strength and generosity and ferocious kindness. You are and will be much missed, and the world is a poorer place without you. Thanks for the memories; they will never be lost.

You will be furious to miss your party, but we promise to do you proud.
