

PARK LEGEND PETER BERRYMAN DIES

Welcome to Parknews All is overshadowed this week by the news of the passing of one of the major figures in the club's history in the form of Peter Berryman. Whether as player, selector, coach, Director of Rugby, Hon Secretary or President Peter gave his all to the club. A commercial lawyer by trade, Peter travelled the world for his work but always returned for his Saturdays at Rosslyn Park indeed on one occasion legend has it that he billed his firm for a return trip on Concorde so that he could make a meeting at the club. In the amateur era his recruitment activities were a legend in the game. A combative scrum half, Peter played in Park's first ever match at the Rock back in the 1950s and was still working for the club over 60 years later. It is an amazing record of dedication. There is not time at present to produce a tribute anything like worthy of the man, but if any of his many friends would like to contribute memories, please send them in to news@rosslynpark.co.uk and we shall in due course publish a more fitting tribute to a wonderful servant.

We do not yet have full details of the funeral arrangements, but understand that the funeral will take place at Mortlake at 09:30 on Monday 19 December, followed by a service at the Rock.

On to more cheerful matters, and a great performance by Park on Saturday to re-ignite our promotion challenge. It wasn't just the win but the nature of it. End-to-end tries and not a chance conceded against a team that – the previous week – had taken runaway league-leaders Rams to the wire, losing by only 3 points. This week Rams lost their first match, and their air of invincibility, at home to Sale FC. The only slight downside there is that Sale, away, are this week's opponents!

Last season we had the better of the match up there only to lose to a try from the last play of the match. One player we shall have to cross swords with is our own former man, Nev Edwards, who has acquired folk hero status locally. Sale FC have made an impressive start to the season, having lost only t - as have Park. Sale's first two defeats came in consecutive weeks, a 27-26 reverse at Cinderford - in which they had a last-play penalty to take the win - coming after a 32-19 loss at then unbeaten Cambridge. Last Saturday brought a tremendous win - away to run away leaders, Rams. The Saturday before that they overcame a poor start to overhaul a 24-7 deficit at home to Darlington Mowden Park, scoring an unanswered 27 points including five tries to run out 34-31 winners. The match before that despite being reduced to 12 men for the final couple of minutes - they won 29-22 at Bishop's Stortford, following on from victories against Hull (34-7), Chinnor (37-18) and Esher (35-21). Before that they had wins against Taunton Titans (31-24), Plymouth Albion (27-24), Leeds Tykes (56-8) and at Birmingham Moseley (32-13) on the first day of the campaign.

It goes without saying that it would be great to get some vocal support up at Sale, where the Our kick off is at 14:30. The station to aim for is Manchester Piccadilly, from where the Altrincham tram will deliver you to the Brooklands stop which is close to the ground at Heywood Rd, Sale M33 3WB. Walk along Marsland Road and Heywood Road is a turning on right, about 300 metres from the tram stop. There are well-publicised problems on the Euston-Manchester line with cancellations meaning you need to get in very early to get a cheap ticket. Some services tend to get reinstated late on, but at grossly extortionate fares. You could get a return flight from Heathrow on BA for £114 return: the ground is not far from Manchester airport but even so, and with taxi booked, you might struggle to make the last return flight at 17:15.

All other matches involving our rugby teams were called off, so this is a shorter than usual Parknews, but we do have two victories to report on the

This was a comprehensive win against a team that had stretched the league leaders all the way the previous week. Park really turned on the champagne rugby in the backs and, whilst rarely truly competitive, it certainly created a spectacle of running rugby.

Park attacked from the start but it was 9 minutes before they got on the scoreboard, catching Taunton offside and hammering the penalty to touch at which point the forwards took over. A textbook driving maul saw hooker Jared Saunders get over with fly half Craig Holland converting for 7-0.



A rare Titans attack was snuffed out by a try-saving tackle from fullback Henry Robinson before Park scored again. The pack put pressure on the visiting scrum, winning a penalty that was kicked to touch, setting up the driving maul. This time it was prop Sam Garvey who touched down, Holland converting for 14-0 on 18 minutes.

Seven minutes later Park were in again, switching the ball wide on the right for winger Ben Howard to sprint in out wide. Holland converting for 21-0.

Prop Jake Buckingham looked to have scored for Park, only to see it ruled out to sounds of disbelief from the stands. Park promptly set up another telling maul, which was brought down but not before Saunders had peeled off the back to claim his second try, and the 4try bonus point on 33 minutes. Holland's conversion attempt bounced off the post so the score remained 26-0.



Following some neat work by Matt Gordon, scrum half Seb Strang ran away with the line at his mercy only for the referee to miss the most blatant of trips. Justice was soon done however, via a neat try from winger Benji Marfo, converted by Holland for the interval score of 33-0.

Any thoughts of a Taunton comeback were staunched when Park almost scored but for a knock on, then centre Matt Gordon stripped a Taunton defender of the ball, sending Holland away who passed wide for flanker Arthur Ellis to sprint in at speed with barely 5 minutes on the clock, taking the score to 38-0.

Strang made a great break to set his half back partner, Holland, up to gallop in on 53 minutes, converting his own effort to take the score to 45-0.

Park piled on the pressure in an impressive display of high-speed running rugby. Howard nearly went in but for a last breath knock on; Holland had a "try" ruled out for a double movement in placing the ball. Eventually, with 10 minutes remaining, Park won a penalty, Holland took a quick tap to Bradbury who sent a peach of a pass for Oli Robinson to glide over. Holland's conversion brought the final score of 52-0.

On this showing it would be far too early to write off Park's promotion chances just yet. A difficult match at Sale awaits next week.

Rams remain 5 points clear at the top despite a 24-27 home defeat to our next opponents, Sale FC. Away travel

Our first away match in the New Year is a Friday night floodlit match at **Chinnor** on 06 December, kicking off at 8:00PM. The Club would like to run a coach / minibus for supporters as it is a bit touch-andgo to get back from the match by public transport. The price and precise mode of transport really depends upon the level of support. The club can't afford to do that at a loss, but so long as costs are covered would not be looking to profit from it. It would really help if anyone interested could register with Cori Poole in the club office (<u>Cori.Poole@rosslynpark.co.uk</u>) so we can assess the likely demand. We are aware anecdotally that there may be some who would prefer to get there under their own steam, but get a lift back. That's fine, but it will not be possible to discount a 'return only' fare.

If you want to go under your own steam regardless, then Haddenham & Thame Parkway is the stop to aim for, from London Marylebone. There is a pretty regular service, with some trains quicker than others so check the timetable. A cheap day return is probably the cheapest ticket. If you are thinking of making a day of it, Thame is quite an interesting market town with several decent (but expensive) pubs. There is a bus from the stop just outside the station that goes very close to the ground, though some buses only go to the Thame town centre (the ground is walkable from there). There is also a cab office next to the station, and if they have a cab free getting that to the ground is probably your best bet. If you are planning to get a train back to London then it is essential to have a cab booked.

After that our next away match is at **Bishops Stortford** on 21 January. For that match a Cheap Day return is again likely to be the cheapest ticket. The ground is just about walkable from the station or town centre if you are fit and raring to go, but most would probably opt for a cab. If you are looking to make a day of it, there are a few old pubs in town but if you're not a Wetherspoons person you are unlikely to find anything open before noon.
