

BONUS POINT WIN SEES PARK BACK ON TRACK

Welcome to Parknews Much has happened since Parknews last appeared, not all of it entirely positive. The editor was on holiday and unable to attend the Chinnor match, therefore not qualified to comment in any detail. However, clearly to have an early 12-0 lead and then concede 48 unanswered points to a club in the bottom four at the time is not ideal. Chinnor were playing their first match under new DoR Nick Easter, and were clearly up for it, but even so...In his programme notes on Saturday Head Coach Jonathan Mills described it as a poor performance and that it had led to "some honest conversations", so best to leave it at that. Last Saturday we returned to winning ways against another bottom club playing under a new coach, Mike Umaga, under whom Hull had grabbed a losing bonus point at Rams the previous week. Park won 38-28, a score a bit closer than it should have been thanks to two late Hull tries that saw them leave with a bonus point (report further on). Conceding a total of 76 points in two matches against two bottom clubs is not good form by any standard: every club goes through a dip at some stage during the season, and it is when solid vocal support really helps. Those who turned up early enough to watch the Rangers' curtain raiser league match against Richmond Saxons on Saturday witnessed the better match of the two on the afternoon, a real cracker certainly from a spectator viewpoint. Rangers lost out 40-45 but a brave second half comeback from 33-14 down, battling into a strong wind had Richmond hanging on desperately at the end. Again, there is a report further on. The Nomads had a good win over Weybridge Vandals in controversial circumstances (see Will's report later). The club's netball teams continue to be successful. The previous week the Park Surrey team beat Weybridge Vandals 41-38 in a thriller at Roehampton Uni, while last weekend our two Kingston League sides stayed top of their respective leagues with away wins, Reds winning 33-24 at Reigate while the Blues won 90-26 at Ashford.


This weekend both Firsts and Rangers are away at Bishops Stortford on Saturday. Stortford are in their highest ever position in the leagues, sixth, after last Saturday's 26-14 away defeat at Rams before which they had won six of their last eight matches. Only the top three clubs have won at Silver Leys this season, so it will be a stern test of Park's mettle. Earlier in the season they ran us close at the Rock, losing by 29-23. Your support would be very welcome. They are a friendly, traditional Rugby club with a decent clubhouse, but with financial support from the RFU drying up for clubs at our level they have been unable to do as much as they would wish to the pitch surrounds, so stout shoes are in order. A Cheap Day return is likely to be the cheapest ticket on the train, and if you are on the tube system, Tottenham Hale may be the most convenient station to pick up a train. The ground is just about walkable from the station or town centre if you are fit and raring to go, but most would probably opt for a cab. If you are looking to make a day of it, there are a few old pubs in town but if you're not a Wetherspoons person you are unlikely to find anything open before noon.

We have one home match this Saturday. **Nomads** play **Guildford 2** in the Surrey Championship, kicking off at 3:00PM at the Rock. Both the **B XV** and the **Fours** are away, to **HAC 2** and **Hammersmith & Fulham 2** respectively, in Middlesex Merit Premier. Our **Surrey** League netball side have a Premier A match away to **Oxshott**.

Park were back on the attack straight away, winning a penalty that was sent deep into Hull territory for an attacking lineout from which hooker Charlie Piper's fine run sent in flanker Arthur Ellis. Smith got the conversion for 12-0.

Following a brief period of midfield deadlock, Park were in again on 26 minutes. Gaining a penalty at a scrum they set up a long-distance maul that had the visiting defence in full retreat for Hay to gain his second try, Smith again converting for 19-0.

Park might easily have extended their lead but for conceding penalties for technical offences to concede possession. In the event it was Hull, hitherto bottled-up by some fine tackling, with a fine try on the half hour by winger Jack Edwards darting down the wing. Full back Reece Dean hit a good conversion to bring up the half-time score of 19-7.

Park, now with the strong wind at their backs, made a positive start to the second period, launching a big attack from kick-off. A lineout saw the ball released to Ellis who plunged over for his second try, bringing up the bonus point on 45 minutes and taking the score to 26-7 with Smith's conversion.

Park looked to be out of sight when they mauled over but the effort was disallowed for a knock-on. They were very nearly in again but the move was halted for a forward pass. Park looked to have put the game to bed on 62 minutes when Hull were pinged for a high tackle. The kick was pinged to the 22 and the maul saw replacement hooker Jared Saunders touch down for 31-7.

Hull were still in there fighting and a fine move was finished by full-back Dean, who converted himself for 31-14 on 69 minutes.

It took Park less than 5 minutes to restore their lead when, following a scrum, Prop Sam Garvey finished off a move with replacement flyhalf Craig Holland converting for 38-14.

If the game seemed over, Hull had other ideas, replying almost immediately with a try from Alex Todd, converted by Dean for 38-21 on 75 minutes.

Hull threw everything they had at Park and got the bonus point their efforts demanded with the last play of the match through winger Keane Naylor, converted by Dean for 38-28.

It seems very unlikely that Hull can avoid relegation after their poor start to the season. But after running Rams close the previous week, this performance suggests that if they do go down it could be only a temporary state of affairs.

Park very nearly pulled off an amazing comeback against the second string of the Championship side in a really entertaining encounter. Playing with a strong wind at their backs, Park received kick-off and hit a glorious 50-22 to claim a throw deep into Richmond territory. This led to a strong attack but the defence managed to strangle it and clear.

A good move saw full-back Henry Robinson combine with winger Ben Howard to take Park back to the visitors' 22. Another good move was stymied by a dropped pass and it was against the run of play when Richmond took the lead on 14 minutes with a driving maul giving them a 5-0 lead.

Such was the strength of the wind that Park's kick-off passed over the dead-ball line, allowing Richmond possession on halfway. They set up a series of pick and drives, eventually getting over on 18 minutes, the conversion extending their lead to 12-0.

Park got back into the game with a really good attack that saw young scrum half Jack Webster – who has played every level for Park minis and juniors – come onto the ball and race away to score. Converting his own effort, he showed composure enough when the ball blew off the tee to pick it up and hit a smart drop kick between the posts.

Some smart defensive work from Robinson brought a last ditch tackle in the corner, but it was only a temporary stay of execution as Richmond went over out wide and a great conversion made it 19-7.

Speed of thinking and sheer pace brought another good try to the visitors, converted for 26-7 on 35 minutes.

It got worse when straight from receiving kick-off Richmond set up a blinding move down the left to score and convert for 33-7.

Park were still battling and managed a score just before half-time when a rolling maul saw Matty Edwards get over, Webster converting for 33-14 at the interval.

The second period started with a brilliant move by Park, but it was stopped by Richmond who broke away to extend their lead to 38-14.

Now playing into the strong wind it looked a case of damage limitation for Park, but they showed great character to come back and give the opposition the fright of their lives.

A good attack saw a series of passes end with centre Patrick Dent cross the line out wide and get round behind the posts to give Webster an easy conversion for 38-21.

It was a further blow to the home side when Saxons mauled over and converted for 45-21.

Undaunted Park put together as good attack and a series of pick

and drives on the line brought a penalty, quickly taken for winger Howard to reduce the arrears to 45-26.

Encouraged, Park put together a series of good runs and flanker Diego Costa scored a fine try, Webster again converting for 45-33.

Park set up another attack, a strong maul being held up, but flanker Brendon le Gaulledec broke away to score. Unfortunately a Richmond defender slid in after he had touched down, his boot making contact with the scorer's head. The referee clearly accepted that it was accidental or the card shown would have been a darker shade than yellow. After the scorer was helped off Webster converted for 45-40.

With next to no time remaining Park threw everything at Richmond and were twice thwarted by cynical play, the second incident earning a further yellow card. But time ran out before Park could exploit their numerical advantage. A great game of rugby regardless of the result.

Park opened 2023 with a disappointing loss away at Chinnor on Friday night.

The match started brightly for Park as wing Charlie Walker took only 5 minutes to open the scoring following a sloppy Chinnor clearing kick that went out on the full, giving Park a lineout just outside the hosts' 22. Park used this platform to run an effective set piece move that held Chinnor's defence in the middle of the park and created a 2-on-1 on the right wing that Henry Robinson and Walker duly executed.

Park doubled their lead before the 10-minute mark when Benji Marfo scooped up a loose ball which had come from a Park crossfield kick that, whilst not initially going to hand, had created no small amount of chaos for the Chinnor defence. Marfo still had some work to do once the ball was in his hands, but a deft step and some blistering pace was enough to see him home past the fullback and trailing winger.

Unfortunately, this was Park's last scoring contribution of the night as momentum swung in the hosts' favour and Park were never quite able to regain it. Chinnor responded to Park's early onslaught with

two tries for Max Clementson from the back of driving mauls to level the scores, before a turnover at the lineout allowed Chinnor to spread it wide and take the lead into halftime.

In the second half it was the hosts who started better, now playing with the wind behind them, and they grabbed an early try as a loose ball that had squirted from the side of a midfield ruck was gathered in and carried over. Nick Smith slotted a penalty kick to extend the Chinnor's lead before the home side twice more crossed over from the back of driving mauls.

A late score from winger Kieran Goss after a break from nothing down the right wing served to rub salt in the wounds and cap off a frustrating evening for Park.

An impressive and iconic sight under which many a Rosslyn Park Great would have plied their rugby trade before we moved to the Rock in the 1950's. (Prince Obolensky played his first game for Park here in the 1930's, I beleive).

The scene is set, and an exciting cup tie ensued. All the players seemed a bit rusty after the Christmas break, and the muddy conditions didn't help, but the cobwebs were coughed away. The usual early period sparring and territorial incursions were played out. After about 15 minutes the Druids conceded a penalty in front of the posts, but a gust of wind must have caught the ball at the wrong moment and it failed to reach its target. 0-0 still. However, this miss inspired the 4's into more fluency and potency, and a well worked team move, forwards and backs together, lead to Freddie Balsdon sprinting over on the right.
