

YELLOW CARDS DERAIL PARK'S EFFORT

Welcome to Parknews Saturday's defeat at Rams was a bitter disappointment. It all started so well, with Park dominating the early stages of both halves but Rams defence was superb and stood up to more-or-less anything Park could throw at it. Rams, by contrast, probably spent less time overall in the Park 22 but were lethal given half a chance. Not for the first time, Park conceded too many penalties while in good field positions. Two yellow cards in quick succession left Park with 13 men at a time they had dominated the play. Some will argue that most of the 50-50 decisions went against Park and, while it is easy to have some sympathy with that view, it hardly explains a defeat by six tries to one. With the other three teams in the top four winning, it will now require some freak results elsewhere for us to lift the title, being 20 points behind Rams with only seven matches remaining. However, there is still plenty to play for. It's easy to forget that National One is the top semiprofessional league in the country, in which we are currently fourth. That in itself is guite an achievement, albeit not what we have been fighting for, and we could yet finish in the top 3 as we have yet to play both Cambridge and Sale who currently occupy second and third positions.

Things don't get any easier this week when we visit Cambridge, who are bang in form in second place after a 17-12 away win at Cinderford last Saturday. The margin of last Saturday's loss makes it easy to overlook the positives. Park dominated the match playing with utter commitment until successive yellow cards – neither clear-cut – reduced personnel to 13 men. Reproducing that form for 80 minutes on Saturday, but keeping everyone on the field, would give us every chance of toppling Cambridge. The 'Blood and Sand' have only been beaten three times this season (home and away to Rams, 27-33 and 26-29 respectively, and 26-29 at Birmingham Moseley). It's a big task, but we also have scores to settle: Cambridge won at the Rock 22-24 earlier in the season, a last death penalty to Park shaving the post on the wrong side. Also, on our last two visits we have reserved our worst performances for this fixture and lost matches we should have won. This would be an excellent time to turn that round.

It goes almost without saying that it would be a boost to the players to get a large body of support there. Please note that kick off is at 2:00PM. The ground is Volac Park, Grantchester Road, Cambridge, CB3 9ED. If you are driving take the M11, J12, (A603) to Cambridge. Take 1st right into Grantchester Road (opp. Wolfson College). Ground 300m on right, just past the last house. By train, there is a service from Liverpool Street but the fast service from Kings Cross to Cambridge will be better for most. The ground is nearer the station than it is the town centre. On a fair afternoon it's a pleasant walk past the University botanical garden and across a fen (and, yes, there is a pub en route). For most, though a cab from outside the station may be preferable. Our regulars tend to go into town and take a cab from there. If you invest in a taxi make sure the driver knows you want the ground in Grantchester Road or you could end up at the University ground. There's a decent clubhouse that does a decent pint and reasonable bar food. The formal pre-match lunch upstairs is already sold out, so if you're not with the presidential party you'll have to forego the company of Lord Jeffrey Archer, who is an avid supporter of many years standing.

Elsewhere around the club, the **Rangers** had an excellent victory over their **Rams** equivalents by 23-21 scoring two tries in the last two minutes! The **B's** had a good win over **Streetonians** at the Rock, 36-7, while the **4's** lost 43-37 at **London New Zealand** with the last play of the game. Hats off to the **Nomads** who won 15-13 at **Chobham 2's** with 14 men. More success on the **netball** court, where our two Kingston League teams remain top of their respective leagues. The **Reds** beat **Teddington Thunder** 44-27, while the **Blues** overcame **Focus B** by 44-22.

Alas there is no rugby due at the Rock this weekend, but the Rangers are due to be playing very close by at Barnes in Division 1 of the Halbro competition. Rams 31 Park 10 National 1



Park started this match like a team with a mission, playing with utter commitment and taking the game to their hoists, who had difficulty escaping their own half. Rams' first real escape came after 10 minutes when their powerful scrum won a penalty, but Park won the ball back and returned to the attack, exerting solid pressure in the Rams 22.

The home side presented a superbly organized defence. Park will feel they suffered from being on the wrong end of 50-50 decisions where the attacking side might normally get the benefit of any doubt. The hard fact, though, is that Park failed to turn their dominance into points. The best chance came when Charlie Walker engineered an attack up the right, but centre Will Glover was bundled into touch by a last ditch tackle.

Rams had a chance on 15 minutes when Park were penalized at a ruck. The penalty was hoofed to touch but Park managed to recapture the ball at the lineout. However, the complexion of the game began to change on 16 minutes when full-back Henry Robinson challenged for a ball in mid-air and the Rams player came off second best, to the noisy disapproval of the crowded stand. Another day, another referee, and it might have been called a 'rugby incident' and incurred nothing more than a penalty. The Park man was sent to the bin for 10 minutes.

Initially Park returned to the attack, but on 24 minutes Park were penalized when driving Rams off their own ball, this led to two further penalties, the second of which saw flanker Harry Ledger sent to join his teammate in the bin, vehemently protesting his innocence. Down to 13 men against the league-leaders Park defended bravely but a score looked inevitable, and it came on 29 minutes through Rams centre, and former Rosslyn Park man, Connor Hayhoe. Fly half Will Partington converted for 7-0.

Park refused to lie down and another concerted attack won a penalty roughly on the 22 in front of the posts. They opted to kick for goal and fly half Craig Holland stroked the ball over for 7-3 on 35 minutes, despite being a man down.

Their joy was short lived, when Rams set up an attack and, moving the ball quickly, managed to exploit their extra man releasing right wing Axel Kalling-Smith to score out wide for 12-3.

Having had to cover for missing personnel Park looked as if the half-time whistle could not come soon enough. Instead, with less than a minute to go they suffered a misfortune inasmuch as the ball squirted out of a melee in a random direction finding Hayhoe who reacted instantly and went over for his second try, converted by Partington for 19-3 at the interval.

Having had the better of the play in the first half, but emerging for the second period 16 points in arrears, Park's prospects looked bleak. But refreshed from the break Park gave it a good shot, taking the game to their hosts. They looked to be a tad unlucky when what looked like a deliberate knock on, on the home 22, brought only a scrum.

On 45 minutes Park won a penalty which Holland hammered to the 5 metre line. Rams collapsed the maul and had a prop yellow-carded for his troubles. Park set up another maul as a result and prop Cameron Zeiss got over the line, Holland converting for 19-10 on 47 minutes. Suddenly the impossible seemed possible.



It was not to be as Rams asserted and started to show why they are top of the league. Following a scrum they quickly worked the ball wide for winger Zach Clow to go in on 53 minutes, Partington's conversion stretching the lead to 26-10.

It was now Park's defence that had to withstand pressure. A kick to touch brought an attacking line-out. A clever 50 / 22 kick saw another, but Park managed to capture the ball and clear.

But the writing was on the wall. A penalty to touch on 78 minutes brought another line-out and number 8 Max Hayward broke from the lineout to make it 31-10.

Another fine 50 / 22 kick exerted pressure for centre Ellis Jones to go in, replacement Rowan Grundy converting for 38-10.

It just about summed up Park's afternoon when, in the last nmoments they forced their way into the Rams 5-metres, only for Hayhoe to hoof a massive clearance, gathered by Kalling-Smith to sprint in for the final score of 43-10


After that it's Taunton Titans away, which is a lovely trip. Normally the advice would be to get in now for the cheapest rail tickets, but that Saturday has been declared a strike day on the railways so you might want to exercise some caution. But if you want to risk it, Paddington is the station to book from, and it's a fair walk along the river to the ground so you might want to catch a cab.

Experimental Laws

There are some experimental laws in the Super Rugby competitions, most of which will not affect National One, even if more widely adopted, since they are designed to speed things up in the area of the TMO. (TMO interruptions will be restricted to serious clear and obvious dangerous play. Yellow Card TMO reviews will take place after sanctioned players leave the field rather than delay the match with several reviews. It would then be possible to upgrade the sanction to a 20min red card). There will be strict time limits enforced for kicks at goal, lineouts, scrums and rucks, using a stop clock that will be visible to spectators and viewers. One law that

might be more widely adopted is one trialled extensively across New Zealand in their community game. The non-putting in scrum half will have to remain in the middle of the scrum, and stay within 1m of it. Their existing other options – to their own back foot line, or to join their own backs 5m back – remain the same. There will also be a Golden point (in 10min extra time) for drawn matches to try to produce a winner.
