

PARK ARE BACK TO WINNING WAYS

Welcome to Parknews The Firsts returned to winning ways in a tense encounter with a fired-up Birmingham Moseley on Saturday. The visitors had come oh so close to toppling the league-leaders, Rams, the previous weekend and were clearly 'up' for claiming a scalp and full of confidence this time. The match itself was perhaps not a classic, but what it might have lacked in quality not helped by innumerable delays and interruptions in play - it more than made up for in tension as Park were made to fight every inch of the way to claim a hard-fought victory. The game ended three tries each and fly half Craig Holland converting all three for Park accounted for the difference in points. Unfortunately the lack of a bonus point meant that the two top sides - Rams and Cambridge - stretched their lead over us by a further point. Now 18 points behind the second club and with only five games left, three of them away, it would take a miraculous set of results for us to catch them. The third club, Sale, are 16 points ahead but they also failed to collect a bonus point on Saturday against the bottom club, Hull, and have yet to visit the Rock: were they to endure a couple of defeats before then we could be playing them for a potential third place. Snapping at our heels, five points behind, are Bishops Stortford. And one place behind them are our next home opponents, Plymouth Albion. There's still plenty to play for in this season.

Elsewhere, our top-of-the table Kingston League teams both played on the netball courts in the morning. The **Park Reds** won 54-31against **Fetcham**, and remain top of the table, followed by the **Blues** coming back from an early 5-1 deficit to beat local rivals **Putney** by 62-37to remain unbeaten. The **B XV** lost a closer match than the score suggests away to **Hammersmith & Fulham** 18-5. A very entertaining game between the **Fours** and **Belsize Park** ended 35-26 in favour of Park. The **Nomads** had to forfeit their match away to **Reeds Weybridge** due ti insufficient players.

This Saturday the First XV have to miss their beauty sleep for the long journey to Leeds Tykes for an **early kick-off at 1:30PM**. While Leeds are in danger of relegation, and we beat them 40-12 at the Rock early in the season, they were in the same predicament when we visited them last season. We won – just – but were mightily relieved to hear the final whistle! Their league position disguises the fact that many of their matches could have gone either way – they have lost by 7 points or less in nine matches and drew with Cambridge and Birmingham Moseley, and recently led for aa long time at fifth-placed Bishops Stortford before finally going down 17-14. They are very much a team to be respected and will be giving everything to avoid the drop. It would of course be an immense help to have some solid vocal support there.

In visiting Leeds Tykes we are breaking new ground: they have moved from the palatial Headingley stadium to groundshare with West Park at the more homely Sycamores at Bramhope (Leeds LS16 9JR). Leeds is the station to book to, and get in quickly because there are few of the cheapest tickets left as we go to press. It's a fair distance from Leeds station to Bramhope, so a cab may be expensive if there aren't a few of you to club together. Bus X84 from Leeds bus station takes 29 minutes, leaving at 03 and 33 past the hour and passes close to the ground. The bus station is a 0.7 mile walk from the rail station according to Google maps. This information was taken from the internet and given in good faith, but do check things for yourself. And remember it's a 1:30 kick-off

If you can't make it to Leeds we have some Rugby entertainment for you at home with a noon kick-off for the **B XV** against **London Cornish**. It's free admission, the clubhouse will be open and you can watch the 6-nations on the TV afterwards. Those of you who were impressed by the **netball** demonstration before last Satuday's match can watch the real thing on Saturday morning when **NC Rosslyn Park** take on **Alpha** in an important

Park 21 Birmingham Moseley 19

It was a long, cold afternoon as Park battled to overcome old rivals Moseley in a stop-start match that was nevertheless a real nail-biter from beginning to end.

Park had the first real chance when Moseley were penalized at the scrum and then sinned again to allow fly half Craig Holland to kick his side deep into opposition territory. The visiting defence was equal to the danger, but at this stage Park looked the better side in a fairly even contest.

A largely midfield battle took a turn at the end of the first quarter when Matt Bolwell cleared out from a ruck in the Moseley half and the referee showed him the yellow card.

Moseley strove hard to make their extra man count. They gained a penalty for a high tackle, the another penalty allowed them to kick to the corner but Park managed to steal the ball on the lineout.

However, another penalty on 26 minutes was Park's undoing when it led to visiting winger Aquile Smith being set up to use all his speed and evasive skills to defy three tacklers and score in the corner for 5-0

Park countered, and a mighty kick from Holland took them close to the line. That move was stopped for a knock-on but a powerful shove sent the Moseley pack sideways and Park got the put-in. The visitors' defence were eventually able to resist.

However, they were unable to stop Park five minutes before half time. A great move saw the ball spread wide where replacement Luc Smith, playing at full-back with Henry Robinson moving to the wing, came on to the ball at pace and sprinted away to score. Holland added a conversion for Park to take the lead, possibly slightly against the run of play.

Things went back Moseley's way when scrum half Dave Lewis stopped a break illegally. There were plenty of other defenders around: if the penalty was fair enough the yellow card he received looked a tad harsh for a first offence. From the penalty Moseley set up a maul and drove over against Park's reduced numbers, Ryan Roach claiming the try. Fly half Dan Lewis added a conversion for a 12-7 lead at half-time.

Roach turned villain early in the second half for illegally stopping a good Park move (the card looked equally harsh as the one just before the interval, so consistency was established). Park set up a maul 10 metres out and Moseley's resistance was excellent but eventually futile as Park rubled over for hooker Charlie Piper to touch down.

Holland converted for a 14-12 lead.

Park returned to the attack, courtesy of the Holland boot. Moseley resisted well but were undone by conceding two successive penalties, taken as taps, and flanker Matt Bolwell got over the line, Holland converting for 21-12 on 50 minutes.

To their credit Moseley raised their game and forced Park to resist.

On 62 minutes it looked as if Park had come undone when attacking in Moseley territory and conceded an interception. The interceptor was a huge forward, who looked relieved when the whistle went as the prospect of running the length of the field opened up before him. The referee had been playing an advantage to Park.

However, four minutes later Park were caught out, losing the ball in contact and replacement Jack English got over for 21-17. When

Lewis' conversion bisected the posts Moseley were within a penalty of the lead at 21-19.

Although vulnerable with only a 2 point lead going into the last 10 minutes, Park kept their heads. A great kick from replacement scrum half Luke Baldwin sent Moseley back to their 22. Charlie Piper produced a good turnover. On their second half performance Park deserved the win, but all credit to Moseley for making them fight every inch of the way for it.

The Reds came out focused and controlled. The attacking unit worked cohesively and demonstrated great patience and calm. Gilbert and Birks balanced well to facilitate smooth passages of play through to goal which were largely unimpeded by the Fetcham defence, while shooting duo Eeles and Hicks dominated their space in the circle and shot confidently with impressive accuracy. Moreover, tight through-Court defence resulted in a number of heldball turnovers and forced errors from the opposition. As Fetcham struggled to find their rhythm, the Reds capitalised and broke away to end the first quarter 19-8 up.

Fetcham returned to Court in the second quarter with a fresh

energy; their attacking unit began to click, and the defensive pressure increased. The Reds managed, however, to maintain their 11-goal lead and head into the second half 29-18 up, where the momentum quickly shifted back in their favour.

At the attacking end Marsh entered the game at GA and immediately sank a number of long-range shots, bringing back to the shooting circle the confident energy of the first quarter. Meanwhile Paterson's move into C brought a renewed control and a stronger defensive presence. Rosslyn Park National Schools 7s - correction

There are a few amendments we need to make to the announcement in the last Parknews, and thanks to Tony Lawrence for the corrections. Tony, along with wife Lynn, is one of the stalwart volunteers who keeps the tournament on the road, and is the expert on it' playing statistics, which are staggering. During the week 2120 matches will be played on 22 pitches, plus two reserve pitches, all more-or-less adjacent to the Robin Hood roundabout on the A3 (by the big Asda store). This year there are 1006 school teams with squads of 12 competing, comprising some 12,000 players - and there are several more teams waiting in the wings, hoping someone will drop out! In addition to schools from the home nations there are two schools from Dubai, two from Belgium plus teams from Sweden and Netherlands. Unfortunately the Mugwana school from Uganda have had to pull out, but additionally we have teams from Shawnigan Lake in Canada, St Kevin's College in Australia and Nelson College in New Zealand.

So it's now less than two weeks to the start of the biggest, best and most prestigious junor Rugby tournament in the world, the Rosslyn Park National Schools 7s. The attention of the great and good of the rugby world will be focussed on our club. Yet many of our own members and supporters seem unaware of it – that cannot be right! Do yourself a favour: book your leave now and come along and enjoy a feast of sport. This year's tournament runs from Monday 20 March until Friday 24 March.

Many of the great and good of the Rugby world will be there, many of them having played in the tournament themselves as youngsters, rubbing shoulders with the crowds and you're bound to see some future international starts on the pitch. That's one reason there will be Premiership talent scouts and coaches among the crowds. There are bars and food outlets plus trade stands. Amazingly the whole thing comes with free admission (though there is a charge for parking). The site is easily accessible by public transport: the 85 (Putney Bridge – Kingston) and 265 Putney – Tolworth, via Rosslyn Park) buses stop outside. If you really can't make it then the matches on the main pitch are all broadcast live on the tournament
