

PARK WIN AT CINDERFORD TO FINISH FOURTH

On more important matters, Saturday's match at Cinderford was a real cracker. An end of season match in the best sense: with little depending upon it in terms of league position both sides threw off the shackles and produced a match of super running rugby with eleven tries. It was a credit to National One. Compared with watching the robots of the Premiership crashing into each other it was refreshing to watch the sport as it should be played. It was a pity in one way that either side had to lose, but taken over the whole eighty minutes Park deserved to edge it. After some recent disappointments it was good to end the season on a positive note.

Recent retirees Jack Gash, Henry Robinson and Nick Lovell did not take part in the match, but it speaks volumes for the spirit in the team that they all turned up to vocally support their mates. Thanks also to the group of Park juniors (and their parents) who also make the journey, along with Rosslyn Park flags. When they changed ends at half time, marching in front of the stands, they were loudly (but entirely good-naturedly) booed by the Cinderford fans – so they did it twice more!



It's not the end of the season at the Rock because we have the London Floodlit 7s coming up on Thursday 25 May (see adjacent box). Before then we have a match on Friday 12 May kicking off at 18:30 which is a curtain raiser for the Inter-Services match the following day. It's Army Masters v Royal Navy Mariners - should be a good bar take that night!

There is just a bit more clarity on promotion and relegation. The RFU Council has decreed that whatever happens elsewhere three teams will be relegated from National One. That means we shall lose a local Derby next season because **Esher**'s home defeat by Rams last Saturday, while **Taunton** were beating Leeds Tykes, means that our neighbours will be relegated along with **Hull** and **Leeds Tykes**.. In terms of coming down, assuming all clubs in the Championship stand their ground, we shall gain a local Derby: at the bottom **London Scottish** lead **Richmond** by a single point going into the last Saturday, having beaten their landlords

comprehensively at the weekend. Scottish are away to Nottingham this coming Saturday while Richmond are home to Cornish Pirates. In terms of promotion from our division, if **Cambridge** beat Birmingham Moseley this Saturday and gain a bonus point then they will be Champions, having lost one match fewer than Rams: any other result and **Rams** are champions. Already promoted to National One are **Sedgeley Park**, **Leicester Lions** and **Blackheath**.

Cinderford 31 Rosslyn Park 38 National 1

With both teams committed to attack this was a really entertaining end to the season. Park struck the first real blow when flanker Arthur Ellis aggressively won the ball for his side. Seb Strang, standing in as fly half, hoofed it to touch and it was eventually a pick-and-drive from prop Jake Buckingham that got it across the line for 5-0 on four minutes. Strang's conversion went in off the right-hand post

Benji Marfo went close to scoring, attacking up the left wing and was close to the line when what looked like a scoring pass was snatched by a defender. It was end-to-end stuff, Park having an edge in open play but Cinderford superior in the scrums. It was a penalty at a set piece that saw Cinderford kick to touch and trundle over, flanker Danny Hodge claiming the try on 14 minutes with a pick-and-go after Park had defended well. Scrum half Mark Austin's conversion tied the scores at 7-7

Cinderford gained a line out and looked dangerous, edging towards the line, but were penalised. Park hit back to regain the lead through an excellent barging run from centre Matt Gordon, who passed to Josh Addams and the winger's pinpoint pass saw flanker Arthur Ellis gallop in to restore their lead. Strang's successful conversion this time grazed the left post for 14-7 on 19 minutes.

The home side came back when the referee ruled that Park had illegally blocked a Cinderford attack up their left flank, which led to the home side setting up a maul and eventually driving over. For prop Shaun Knight to claim the score. Austin converted for 14-14.

It was Park who had the last word in an entertaining first half. Strang made an impressive break, getting deep into the home 22 but the ball spilled forward in the tackle. However Park regained the ball and pressed at the line, Buckingham getting over for his second try and a half-time lead of 14-9.



It looked very much as if Park would increase their lead after 6 minutes of the second period, applying immense pressure following a line-out. But what looked like a scoring pass close to the line was snatched by Austin who hared the length of the field and scored under the posts, converting his own effort to snatch the lead at 21-19.

Park nearly replied almost immediately when prop Austin Hay showed a turn of foot to charge down a clearance kick but the bounce was unkind. Cinderford were now incurring penalties in trying to stifle Park's control of the midfield and flanker Matt Lane took one for the team when shown a yellow card on 50 minutes. But

it was the 14 men who scored next when a good move saw winger Mason Tonks score in the corner to extend the lead to 26-19 on 53 minutes.

It took less than 5 minutes to respond with a move that started with a clever box kick under pressure from scrum half Luke Baldwin. Park won a turnover, leading to prop Austin Hay scoring a neat try to close the deficit at 26-26.

Park regained the lead on 62 minutes after a good attack was stopped for a forward pass. Cinderford conceded a lineout and some meat interplay saw full back Max Trimble restore the lead, Strang's conversion extending the lead to 26-33.

The visitors nearly scored again when Strang was stopped while making a sniping run. Cinderford eventually gained a penalty to clear and attacked up the left where Park were pinged for blocking. The penalty was propelled to the corner where Knight again got over for 31-33, setting up a grandstand finish with less that 10 minutes to go.

Park nearly grabbed the winning score when Baldwin sent a neat grubber kick but the ball went out in the corner. Park gained a penalty, hoofed to the corner for the pack to maul over, Hay credited with the try for the final score of 38-31. A great end to the season for Park, but in this match Rugby Union was the real winner. Leeds match off

Just before the Cinderford match, we were told that the following Saturday's match was cancelled, which was a big disappointment to our regular away supporters, who had paid a minimum of £59.80 for "cheap" non-refundable rail tickets, with no prospect of getting their money back. One can understand Leeds' position; their home matches this season have been poorly attended and probably don't cover the match expenses and whatever the result they were relegated anyway. From Park's perspective it's understandable as assuming the transport arrangements can be cancelled it avoids much of the cost of one of the more expensive away matches (the RFU no longer make any contribution to travel expenses). However, had Park left Cinderford without a point and Plymouth Albion had a bonus point win over Rams – admittedly neither very likely – we would have finished fifth rather than fourth. If that doesn't matter then it does seem to slightly devalue the league competition.

Not quite so retiring

When we mentioned last week that Jack Gash and Henry Robinson were retiring at the end of this season, we didn't include Nick Lovell in the item. Nick (holding the number 3 jersey) joined the club as a Mini in 2000, and later rejoined straight from University in 2015 to represent the 1st XV and so - as a Park man through and through -



he will be staying with the club in a player liaison capacity.
